

SOME THOUGHTS ON EDENDERRY BY VERA SMITH

The river Bann is the pivot around which the Borough of Portadown, now the Borough of Craigavon, was built. The first families to reside in the area saw the potential of such a waterway and their vision has brought to birth a town of which every citizen can be proud. From a few families, Portadown has emerged from a small community to a cosmopolitan Borough. The citizens of our borough should be proud of our history and seek to build into its development for future generations. There was not the confusion and build up of traffic we have today in Edenderry. The town was not more than a small village at this period in its history. By the year 1836 there were imports and exports by the River Bann - 18 boats belonging to the town, from 45 to 60 tons each. Iron 250; coal 600; slates 200; flour 50; oatmeal 110 tons a total of 1700 tons of imports. Three-quarters of the timber came from Newry; one-quarter from Belfast - The coal - 200 tons came from Coalisland and the rest from Newry. Groceries, hardware, drapery, etc., came by road from Belfast. Total, exports from Portadown amounted to 5,000 tons. Wheat 2,250; oats 2,500; barley 250.

SEVERE WINTER SPELLS HARDSHIP

To provide for the 156 families, totalling 745 residents of Portadown in 1837, the town's leaders met in a local church to discuss the devastating results of a severe winter among the poor and distressed families.

Land owners of the town including Thomas Conn, James Halligan, Paul Irwin, James Moneypenny, Thomas Pepper, Thomas and John Shillington, and Joseph Woolsey, discussed measures of relief. Members of the committee were appointed to visit the poor in their respective town lands and ascertain the amount of distress and the number of the poor, both as to families and individuals. The men decided that 'a subscription list' be set up immediately and appointments were made to attend to this urgent matter - they were to 'select objects and determine mode and amount of relief'.

At their next meeting, their report was negative, and the results revealed that 'the only one to contribute was Thomas Patterson from the small district of Ballyworkan, who produced £3:00.' It was decided that Thomas Patterson and James Monypenny, 'shall lay it out according to their own discretion.'

The meeting was adjourned, and the committee was not heard of again! I conclude that the men who met at that meeting founded the old Portadown Borough Council, for succeeding mayor's carried the Woolsey /Wolsey name. The late Henry Wolsey, who together with a few other land owners founded the Portadown Times, traced his ancestry to the original Woolsey families.

A BRIGHT FUTURE FOR EDENDERRY

Bridge Street and Edenderry are on the map again. With the redevelopment of the Newry Canal system and the resurfacing of the pedestrian area along the Bann from the Pleasure Gardens, it paves the way for a brighter future. When the new Bridge opens, this should become a major attraction and make the waterway a pleasure for walkers and a paradise for fishermen. Hopefully, we shall see the area welcoming more visitors from Europe and beyond to navigate our waterway heritage and enjoy the quietness and pleasure of the Ulster countryside.

Those residents who have lived in Edenderry for generations and businesses that have been affected by the disruption of the work on the new bridge are longing for the day when the area will be transformed. Many of our senior citizens want to live to see the day when the happiness of their childhood will be restored for all to enjoy. Those involved in business want to see a vibrant and thriving commercial Edenderry buzzing with activity and a pleasure for shoppers.

I think my ancestors, especially Benjamin Woolsey, on whose estate Edenderry was founded, would be proud of such development! The Christmas decorations have brightened the town and lifted the spirits of all. Our council have done an excellent job! CONGRATULATIONS!

The ongoing work on the bridge would tend to cast a shadow over Edenderry, but we will not weaken in our endeavour to rise beyond the disappointment and anticipate *THE BEST CHRISTMAS EVER* and the prospect of a face lift for the whole Bridge Street and Edenderry areas in the near future.

The people of Edenderry are resilient and will enjoy the pre-Christmas atmosphere of family friendliness, and Good Will.

Cardwell McClure showed photos of rare and unique items he had come across as well as backstamps from 1947 to 1992 when the factory closed. newspaper cuttings going back to when the factory opened. He also has in his possession the original factory visitor's book. Harry Eakin had part of his collection on display and gave a very interesting talk on same. HEROES OF EDENDERRY

At this seasonal time our thoughts should dwell on those who are no longer with us, though moving letters and eyewitness accounts James Kane tells the story of Thomas Cordner of Joseph Street, Edenderry who was killed trying to save the life of his comrade.

Thomas Cordner


Thomas was born on 14 November 1895 the Son of Emily and stepson of Joseph McCrory of Foundry Street, Portadown. He served in 'A' Company, 1st Battalion, Royal Irish Fusiliers. Private Cordner had risked his life in helping one of his wounded colleagues as Private Edward Burns of Jackson's Row described.


You ask me to let you know how poor Thomas Cordner met his death. Well it was trying to save W. Hanvey. After Hanvey got wounded Thomas went out to try and bring him into the trenches, when he also met the same fate. Both died shortly after. He was my best chum. He and I used to lie awake at night and talk how we would spend Christmas in Portadown. Little did we think he was so near the end. A short while before his death Thomas had written a poignant letter to his mother.

Just a few lines in answer to your loving letter. Glad to hear you are not too bad. We came back to Shorncliffe this morning from Minster to mobilise. We expect to be in touch with the enemy on the 14^{th} of this month, but, mother, I will go out with a good heart. We are in one of the divisions that go out first. I am sending you these photos and prayerbook. You can do what you wish with them, but if ever I have the luck to come home I would like to get some of them. I send the children my best love. I would like to hear from you before I go out. From your loving son, to mother, til death.

Private 11254, Thomas Cordner 1st Battalion, Royal Irish Fusiliers was killed in action on 9 November 1914 in Belgium aged 18 years. He lies buried in Strand Military Cemetery Ploegsteert, Belgium.
